
ANOTHER MINE STARTS IN ANTHRACITE FIELD.

SCRANTON, Penn., Aug. 19.—A stir was created among the striking miners to-day by the starting up of the extensive Hampton Colliery of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western system.

Assistant Superintendent Phillips of the Lackawanna Coal Department says that a hundred miners are employed, and that the mine will be operated continuously. Many of the miners, he says, were former members of the United Mine Workers' organization, but were forced to return to work on account of starvation confronting them.

The Hampton is supplied with the most improved appliances, and it is said can produce a great deal of coal, even under present circumstances. It is the third large colliery which the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Company is operating, despite the strike.

The others are the Dodge and the Cayuga, both situated in this city. The Lackawanna is also taking coal from the People's Coal Company colliery, where 100 gondola cars are loaded and shipped each day. Altogether, there are now five mines at work in the Lackawanna Valley.
